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#### Aims and scope:

In the early twenties of the last century, Alexander A. Friedmann (1888-1925) derived from the system of ten Einstein's equations applied to a perfectly symmetric universe, which is homogeneous and isotropic for every fixed time instant, a nonlinear differential equation for the expansion rate of the universe. The question is whether one can perform such excessive extrapolations, *i.e.* to apply Einstein's equations to galactic or cosmological scales.

The current standard model of cosmology is based on the normalized Friedmann equation which contains, as major parameters, densities of dark matter and dark energy. So, it is timely to gather specialists from different disciplines, including galaxy evolution and planetology, to discuss the problem of existence of dark matter and dark energy at various scales, both from theoretical and observational points of view.

- A systematic discord in the value of the Hubble constant at various scales

- Complementary redshifts of non-cosmological nature
- Quantum effects on the early universe and their observational imprints nowadays
